## MPUMALANGA LAUNCHES TRANSPORT MONTH

Mpumalanga MEC for DPWRT(Department of Public Works Roads and Transport), Thulasizwe Thomo, led the Inter-Provincial Law Enforcement Operation held at Grootvlei along the N3 Corridor, Dipaleseng Local Municipality, to officially launch the 2025 October Transport Month campaign.

The operation was reportedly a collaborative move involving the N3 Forum made up law enforcement stakeholders from the provinces of Gauteng, KwaZulu-Natal, and the Free State.

## Mpumalanga learners shine in Road Safety Debate

Mpumalanga learners put the province on the map by emerging victorious during







the prize-giving function of the 2025 National Road Safety and Participatory Educational Techniques competition held at Time Square in Pretoria.

The learners competed with their counterparts from other provinces including Limpopo, KwaZulu-Natal, Eastern Cape, Western Cape, Northern Cape, Free State, North West provinces, and were honoured for demonstrating exceptional skills in debating and presenting road safety proposals, winning top spots in both urban and rural categories.

According to the spokesperson for Mpumalanga DCSSL(Department of Community Safety, Security, and Liaison), Moeti Mmusi, the National Road Safety Debate and PET competitions are held annually targeting Grade 10 and 11 learners. "The learners debate

on road safety motions whilst the PET encourages participants to do research and identify road safety challenges in their communities. They then come up with proposals and present them to panels of adjudicators at all levels of the competition," said Mmusi.

The Interim Chief Executive Officer for RTMC (Road Traffic Management Corporation), Refilwe Mongale, said the competition targets over 1000 learners from different provinces in various schools.

"This programme has a huge impact on learners as they research and acquire knowledge on road safety. Through this programme, the learners learn basic skills such as research and public speaking," said Mongale.

Mpumalanga MEC for DCSSL, Jackie Macie, encouraged participants to become

active road safety ambassadors in their communities, emphasising the importance of spreading the message to prevent needless loss of lives from road crashes.

"We want all the participants, past and present, to become active road safety ambassadors in their communities and everywhere they go. Every crash statistic represents a life lost. Therefore, the learners must help us spread the message," said Macie.

Each learner on all the categories received a medal, trophy and a cheque amounting to R6600. The province also scooped the Best Speaker in Debate Urban Category. Sasha Nkabinde, a Grade 11 learner from Jerusalem Secondary School near Hazyview, took the first place as best speaker. All four trainers of the categories won Best Trainer awards, medals and trophies.



According to DARDLEA, the 3-day event was attended by delegates from the USA(United States of America), Kenya, Czech Republic, Belgium, Netherlands, Zimbabwe, and Indonesia.

The symposium was also attended

by researchers, chemical companies, Extension Practitioners and students, who discussed Nematodes, its dangers on crops and progress made on research thus far.

"Nematodes are microscopic worms that pose a significant threat to crops by damaging plant roots, preventing nutrient intake, and reducing yields. The NSSA Symposium provided a platform for experts to discuss the dangers of nematodes and share research findings on managing these pests," said DARDLEA.

#### HOUSEHOLD BACKYARD GARDENS KEY TO FOOD SECURITY

October is commemorated as Food Security Month in South Africa since in 2014, providing an opportunity to highlight the plight of millions of undernourished people and heightens public awareness on issues pertaining to food security.

Most of the affected people live in rural areas, with their source of income and survival in agriculture.

World Food Day, celebrated annually on 16 October, was proclaimed at the Conference of the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) of the United Nations in 1979, which was ultimately endorsed by the General Assembly in 1980.

The objectives of Wolrd Food Day is to strengthen solidarity in then struggle against hunger, malnutrition and poverty, but most importantly to promote food production, encourage research and

technology development for food production systems, but also enhance the participation of rural people, in particular women and the underprivileged, on government's programmes that are aimed at halving hunger in South

It is against this background that the Mpumalanga Department of Agriculture, Rural Development, Land and Environmental Affairs (DARDLEA) encourages everyone to play a part in fighting hunger during this Food Security

Africa.

DARDLEA MEC Khethiwe Moeketsi announced during her 2025/26 Policy and Budget speech in July, that her Department will prioritise supporting about 13 000 households, establish 690 backyard food gardens, and cultivate 18 000 hectares, in the effort to fight against hunger.

They affect all kinds of crops, with tomatoes, Bambara groundnut, sweet potato and potatoes being the most susceptible.

The NSSA and advisors are working closely with farmers to find effective solutions that will help them overcome these challenges and ensure a stable food supply.

The MIF (Mpumalanga International Food Market) is taking significant strides in preparing for its muchanticipated launch, with Market Agents engaging farmers across the province.

The agents, including MabFresh, Phambili Ngombono, Aluhlaza Fresh, and Colette H Holdings, have been meeting with farmers in Ehlanzeni, Nkangala, and Gert Sibande Districts to discuss expectations and requirements for supplying produce to the

The MIF is set to revolutionise the agricultural sector in Mpumalanga, providing a platform for farmers to access local, regional, and international markets. With its comprehensive infrastructure and commitment to transparency and inclusivity, the MIF is poised to make a significant impact on the province's economy.

According to DARDLEA, the farmers were informed about the Mpumalanga Government Nutrition Sourcing Bill B-2025, which seeks to support

emerging farmers, revitalise land reform farms, create jobs and enhance market

The bill, which still open for public input, is said to align with the MIF's objectives of promoting agricultural development and economic inclusion in the province.

In addition, DARDLEA said farmers were also advised to register for FBO Codes to prepare for

> supplying the MIF, providing them with a range of options to choose from. "They emphasise

> the importance of good quality products, SAGAP (South African Good Agricultural Practices) and HACCP (Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points) certification, and

adherence to the buyer's code. They assured farmers of a good working relationship, transparency, and the obvious common goal; to make money.

"The agents will sell the produce on behalf of the farmers, who will receive payment within 5 days after supplying their produce, while a commission will be charged by the agent for their services," said DARDLEA.



### DEDT MEC praises Mpumalanga energy

A Ministerial visit to the Kinetiko Energy LTD Gas Project located at Brakfontein Farm, near Amersfoort, in Dr Pixley Ka Isaka Seme Local Municipality, was recently conducted by Mpumalanga MEC for DEDT(Department of Economic Development and Tourism), Jesta Sidell, alongside other senior government officials including the Minister of Minerals and Petroleum Resources, Gwede Mantashe, and his Deputy, Phumzile Mgcina.

The Kinetiko Energy LTD Gas Project is said to be a significant step towards enhancing South Africa's energy supply and supporting the country's just energy transition. According to DEDT, the project underlines government's commitment to renewable energy as a vital part of the national strategy to transition to cleaner energy sources and reduce

the carbon footprint.

Furthermore, DEDT said the project is anticipated to attract substantial investment to the Mpumalanga economy and forms part of the province's economic recovery plan. Speaking during the visit, MEC Sidell said the project is a gamechanger and a testament that Mpumalanga is not just adapting to the just energy transition, but it is actively leading it.

"This onshore gas initiative, in partnership with the IDC (Industrial Development Corporation), is set to unlock significant domestic energy security and powering the industrial growth of this district and the entire province.

"This project is more than just infrastructure; it is an investment in our people. It promises job creation, skills development, and the stimulation of local economic activity in communities that deserve to be at the forefront of this new economic chapter," said MEC Sidell.
